#### 2020 GENERAL ELECTION

With the Coronavirus pandemic, this year's election will look a little different than normal. As news about casting a ballot is constantly developing, we wanted to provide you with some helpful information and links all in one spot so you can make sure your voice is heard.

#### ABSENTEE VOTING

**REQUEST AN ABSENTEE BALLOT:** If you have not already done so, you can request an absentee ballot by either:



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1. [Downloading, printing and mailing your request](#); or
2. [Have a request form mailed to you](#) for you to fill out and return

Once you have filled out your absentee request form, mail it to your County Board of Elections Office. A list of all 88 counties' addresses [can be found here](#). Your absentee request must be received by your County Board of Elections by Saturday, October 31<sup>st</sup> by noon.

Once you have mailed your request for an absentee ballot, you can [track the status of your ballot here](#).

**VERIFYING YOUR BALLOT:** Once you receive your ballot in the mail, you can access a sample ballot online that you can use to verify that your ballot is the correct one for your precinct. You can [access your sample ballot by clicking here](#) and following the prompts. Voters must compare the "AB Style" number in the bottom right corner of the ballot to a sample ballot linked to their address to determine if their ballot is correct.

It has been [reported](#) that nearly 50,000 Franklin County ballots are incorrect. The Franklin County Board of Elections will be mailing a new ballot to those who received the incorrect one. If you have received the incorrect ballot, you can either wait for a replacement ballot to arrive in the mail and cast it, or show up at the Franklin County Board of Elections, 1700 Morse Road, during early voting hours to cast an in-person absentee ballot.

**Once you have received an absentee ballot—regardless of whether it's correct or not—you cannot vote in-person on Election Day.** Doing so will result in your ballot being cast as a provisional ballot. You are, however, eligible to cast your ballot in-person during the *early* voting period if you no longer wish to mail an absentee ballot. If you have already received an absentee ballot in the mail, your local board of elections will ask for it back and give you a new ballot at the early in-person voting site. You're not required to return the other ballot as a condition for getting a new one, however.

**RETURNING YOUR BALLOT:** You have two options for returning your absentee ballot once you have filled it out. You can either:

1. Mail your ballot back
  - Your ballot will include instructions for how to return it and will list how much postage you need. A forever stamp is worth \$.55. However, any ballot without sufficient postage will still be delivered per the US Postal Service policy to not delay ballots.
  - Your ballot must be postmarked by November 2<sup>nd</sup>
2. Take your ballot to the secure ballot drop box

### EARLY IN-PERSON VOTING

**LOCATION:** Each county has a location in which voters can cast early in-person ballots. For most counties, that location is the board of elections office. Six counties have separate early voting sites: Lucas, Trumbull, Clark, Marion, Ashtabula and Summit. [Click here for a list of early voting location addresses](#).

**SCHEDULE:** Early in-person voting begins October 6th and runs through Monday, November 2nd and at 2pm. The early voting locations are open the two Saturdays (8am to 4pm) and two Sundays (1pm to 5pm) leading up to the election. [Click here for a voting schedule](#).

### ELECTION DAY IN-PERSON VOTING

In-person voting is available on Election Day. You can [find your polling location here](#). Voters are encouraged to wear a face mask when inside the voting facility, however poll workers have been instructed to not refuse anyone the opportunity to vote if they do not have a mask.

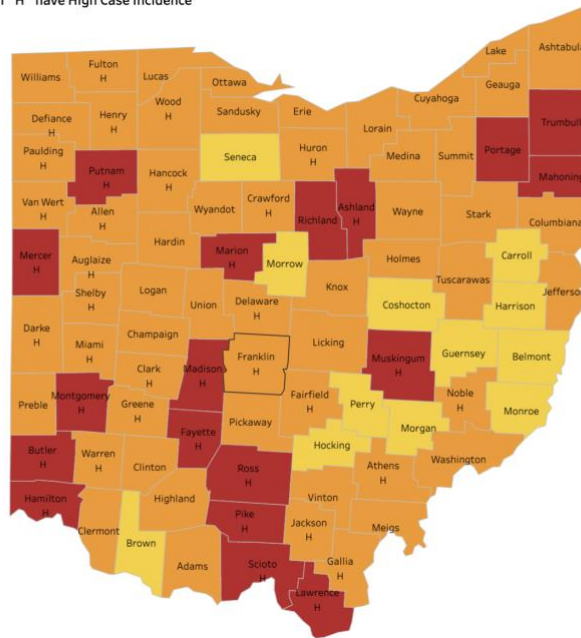

## TESTING LOCATIONS

DeWine has started a walk-up/drive-up testing initiative with the Ohio Association of Community Health Centers and their affiliate members (Community Health Centers) and the Ohio National Guard. These sites will also include other local community-based organizations i.e., faith-based organizations, community centers, food pantries, etc.

Testing for this initiative will be available for individuals with or without symptoms. The test has no out-of-pocket cost to the patient and individuals of any age are able to access the test. Minors will need signed consent of a parent/guardian.

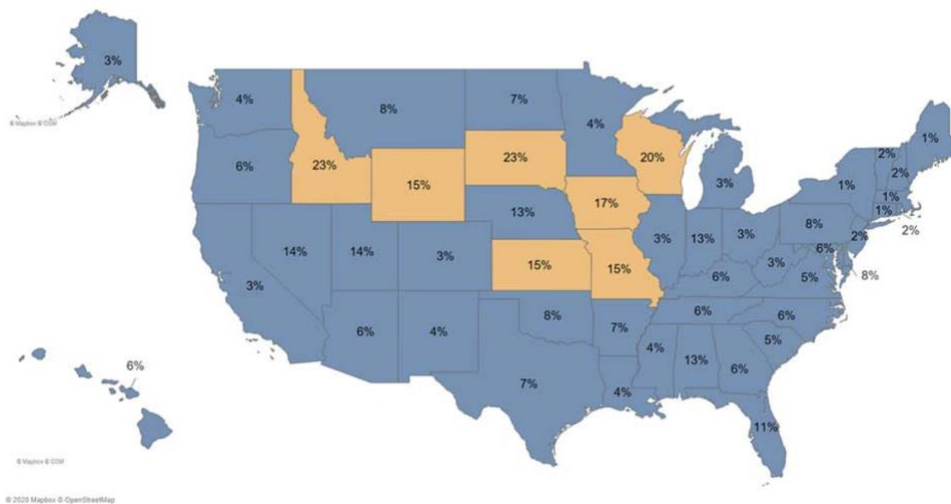

**October 12** – deaths rise to 5,005 total (308 probable), cases rise to 170,179 (9,858 probable)

**October 9** – Ohio sees the largest single-day increase in the course of the pandemic; deaths rise to 4,994 total (308 probable), cases rise to 166,102 (9,622 probable)

**October 8** – Ohio sees the largest single-day increase in positive cases since July 30; deaths rise to 4,983 total (309 probable), cases rise to 164,262 (9,516 probable)

**October 7** – deaths rise to 4,970 total (309 probable), cases rise to 162,723 (9,442 probable)

**October 6** – deaths rise to 4,947 total (309 probable), cases rise to 161,299 (9,316 probable)

**October 5** – deaths rise to 4,931 total (309 probable), cases rise to 159,964 (9,203 probable); the President released from Walter Reed Medical Center

**October 2** – deaths rise to 4,905 total (308 probable), cases rise to 156,809 (9,012 probable); the President and First Lady test positive for COVID-19

**October 1** – deaths rise to 4,817 total (303 probable), cases rise to 155,314 (8,876 probable)

**September 30** – deaths rise to 4,804 total (303 probable), cases rise to 153,987 (8,796 probable)
